Post-Doctoral Fellows:

- DAMIANO ACCIARINO (Marie Sklodowska-Curie Post-doctoral Fellow:) has several publications scheduled for 2018, including a monograph *Lettere sulle Grottesche*, a book chapter, "Renaissance Iconographies of Fate" in *Fate and Fortune in Renaissance Thought*, and a book review of *Renaissance and Reformation*.
- Matteo Brera focuses his research on European literature and ecclesiastical/political policies of book censorship. On this topic he has recently published the monograph *Novecento all'Indice. Gabriele d'Annunzio, i libri proibiti e i rapporti Stato-Chiesa all'ombra del Concordato* (Roma: Edizioni di Storia e Letteratura, 2016).
- Jessica Lynne Harris is a scholar of Modern Italy, Black Europe, Women's History, African American History, and 20th century U.S. and the World, with a particular interest in gender and race, their intersection with material culture, and the subsequent effect on group identities. Her current project explores the cultural presence of African American women in 20th century Italy, particularly in film, television, and fashion.
- MARCO PIANA focuses on the literary representation of Otherness, gender, and religious identity in Early Modern Europe, with special attention to the works of Gianfrancesco Pico della Mirandola, Renaissance Neoplatonism, and prowoman literature. He is also a research associate on the project "Equality and superiority in Renaissance and Early Modern pro-woman treatises" led by Professors Marguerite Deslauriers and Laura Prelipcean and on the project "Early Modern Conversions" led by Professors Paul Yachnin and Stephen Wittek.
- Alessandro Puglisi is a PhD International Visiting Graduate Student, from the University for Foreigners of Siena. Under the supervision of Prof. Salvatore Bancheri and Prof. Simone Casini, he is studying an Italian Language MOOC, *Introduction to Italian*, from a social network analysis perspective. His research focuses on the correlations between the learners' communicative interactions and their learning outcomes. He is conducting an experiment in the ITA100 sections; the students carry out four tasks in 20-minutes, using Twitter. He is observing how the students interact in a social network site, when it is requested to accomplish some simple tasks in a non-native language.

Awards, Honours & Publications

Konrad Eisenbichler was in inducted into the "Golden Book of Illustrious Persons" (*Albo d'oro dei personaggi illustri*) of the Associazione Fiumani Italiani nel Mondo – Libero Comune di Fiume Esilio. The association gathers Italians from the city of Fiume and their descendants. Professor Eisenbichler was recognized as he has contributed significantly to scholarship on the history, literature, and culture of Fiume by publishing articles on the works of Fiuman writers and the collection: *Forgotten Italians: Julian-Dalmation Writers and Artists in Canada* (forthcoming from University of Toronto Press).

Alice Martignoni, PhD student, obtained the prestigious Charles Hall Grandgent Award for the 2018 best graduate research paper in Dante Studies (Dante Society of America). The title of her paper is 'Quatourdeci valentissimi homini romani'. Confronto tra il commento dantesco del Falso Boccaccio (ms. BNCF II 147, cc. 184r – 189v.) e De Civitate Dei V, 18; this paper was submitted as a final essay for the course ITA 1202H (Dante and Augustine) taught by Prof. Brilli.
